

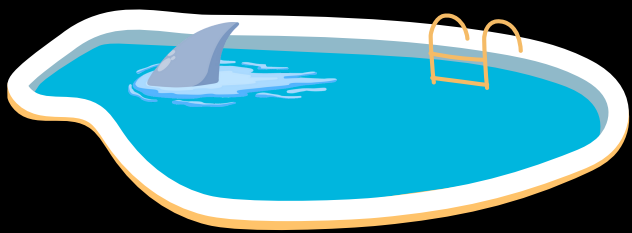

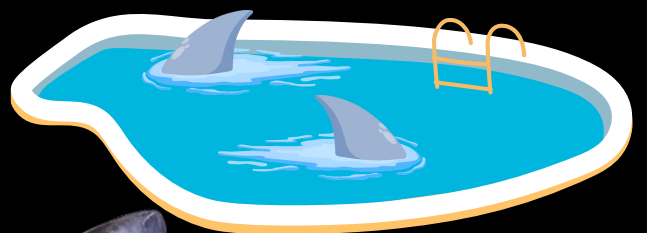
## Suburban Law Firm

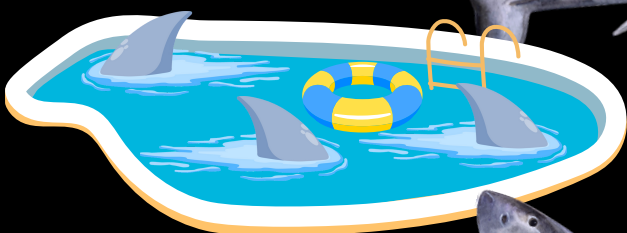
## Boutique Law Firm

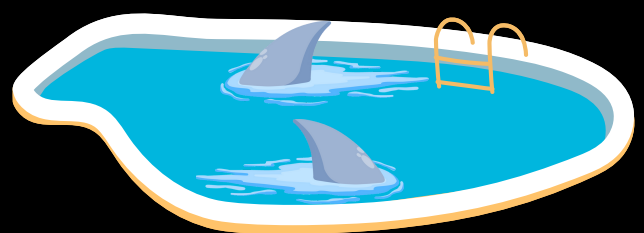
## Big Law Firm
